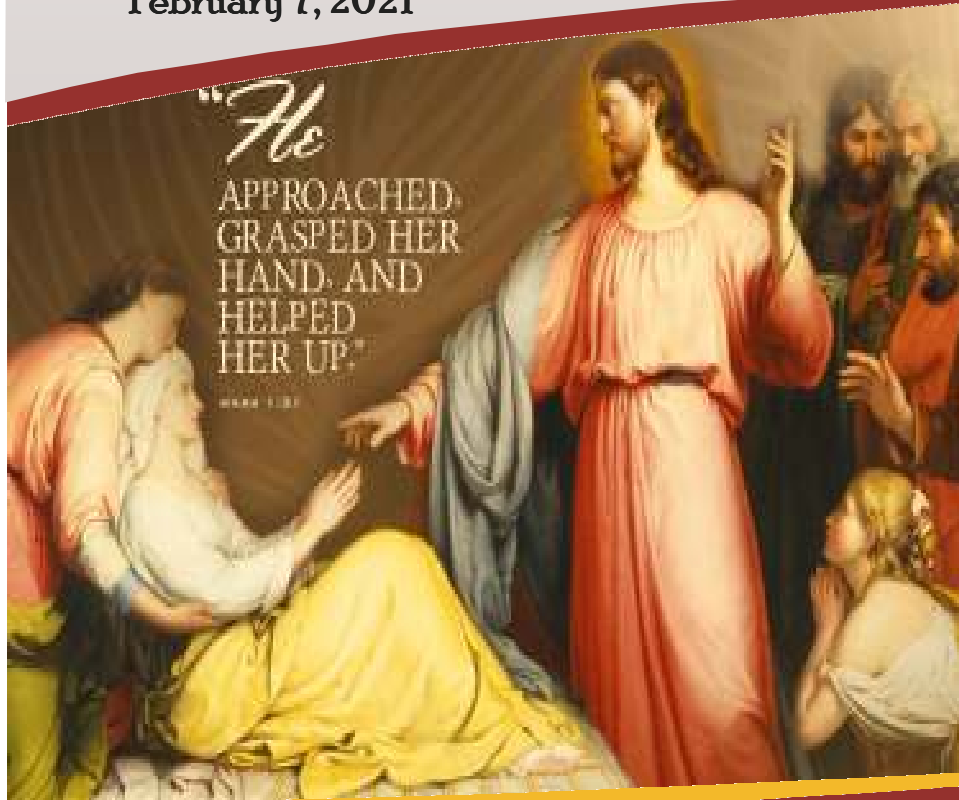

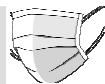

LENTEN VESPERS

A Vesper service will be held each Saturday during Lent prior to the 4:00PM Mass, at 3:25 PM. You are invited to come and pray the Evening Hour of Vespers with the Holy Angels community and the Universal Church. If you regularly come to the 4:00PM MASS, please plan to come a little bit earlier and experience this prayer of the Church.

Vespers is the evening prayer of the Church, one of the "Hours" that are prayed daily by the Church. "The Hours" are prayed by the Ordained ministers, (priests and deacons) as well as many religious, men and women, and the monastic orders. Lay persons in recent times have become more involved with praying "the Hours" as in the Magnificat prayer aid.

The majority of the prayers in the Hours come from the Psalms. Jesus prayed the very Psalms that we now repeat. Mary most likely taught him the Psalms. Jesus quoted the psalms in his preaching and teaching. He recited them at key moments in his life to explain the meaning of his life experience. After the resurrection, the first Christians easily recognized the person of Jesus reflected in these Old Testament prayers.

You are invited to participate and pray these deeply moving reflections of humanity reaching out to the unseen God. Perhaps you can make this a Lenten prayer to deepen our faith in this Year of St. Joseph, a man of faith.

Pastor's Corner



Liturgical Colors



Every day at Mass the priest wears a particular color vestment. I have been asked from time to time what the meaning of the various liturgical colors is. Below is a simple explanation of the different colors. You may have heard additional explanations from time to time about the colors, and the following does not mean to necessarily exclude the other explanations but what is below conforms to the normative explanation.

White:

The symbol of joy, purity, light, glory, and triumph. It is used on all feasts of the joyful and glorious mysteries of our Lord's life (e.g. Christmas and Easter), on the feast of our Blessed Mother, on the feasts of angels and of all saints who were not martyrs. White vestments are also used during the sacraments of Baptism, Marriage, Holy Orders, and is one of the options for Funeral Masses.

Red:

The color of blood, is used on all feasts of our Lord's Cross and Passion (Including Passion/Palm Sunday), on the feasts of the Apostles and of all martyrs. Red is also used on Pentecost and in Masses of the Holy Spirit, in memory of the tongues of fire of the First Pentecost. Thus red is also used for the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Purple:

A symbol of penance and expiation. It is used during the penitential seasons of Advent and Lent, during the Sacrament of Penance (Confession), and on fast days and vigils.

Green:

The color of budding and living vegetation, it is the symbol of hope. It is used during Ordinary Time (time after Epiphany and the time after Pentecost) where there is no other Saint's feast day associated with the date.

Rose:

This color is permitted, in place of purple, on the third Sunday of Advent (Gaudete) and on the Fourth Sunday of Lent (Laetare), when the Church tempers a bit the penitential seasons with an invitation to rejoice in the goodness of God our Savior.

Gold:

Gold vestments are permitted in place of white, red and green vestments. The richness associated with the color of gold tends to heighten the degree of solemnity associated with the celebration.

Black:

The color of mourning and sorrow. It may be used for Funeral Masses, memorial Masses for the Dead and on All Souls' Day.

I hope this was helpful to you in enhancing your worship of God at Mass. I believe the more we know about something the more we can appreciate it. In the coming weeks look for explanations of what a priest wears at Mass as well as the various items a priest uses at Mass.

FEBRUARY 7 — FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Reading I: Job 7: 1-4, 6-7

Job spoke, saying: Is not man's life on earth a drudgery? Are not his days those of hirelings? He is a slave who longs for the shade, a hireling who waits for his wages. So I have been assigned months of misery, and troubled nights have been allotted to me. If in bed I say, "When shall I arise?" then the night drags on; I am filled with restlessness until the dawn. My days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle; they come to an end without hope. Remember that my life is like the wind; I shall not see happiness again. .

Reading II: I Corinthians 9: 16-19, 22-23

Brothers and sisters: If I preach the gospel, this is no reason for me to boast, for an obligation has been imposed on me, and woe to me if I do not preach it! If I do so willingly, I have a recompense, but if unwillingly, then I have been entrusted with a stewardship. What then is my recompense? That, when I preach, I offer the gospel free of charge so as not to make full use of my right in the gospel. Although I am free in regard to all, I have made myself a slave to all so as to win over as many as possible. To the weak I became weak, to win over the weak. I have become all things to all, to save at least some. All this I do for the sake of the gospel, so that I too may have a share in it..

The Gospel: Mark 1: 29-39

On leaving the synagogue Jesus entered the house of Simon and Andrew with James and John. Simon's mother-in-law lay sick with a fever. They immediately told him about her. He approached, grasped her hand, and helped her up. Then the fever left her and she waited on them. When it was evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were ill or possessed by demons. The whole town was gathered at the door. He cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons, not permitting them to speak because they knew him. Rising very early before dawn, he left and went off to a deserted place, where he prayed. Simon and those who were with him pursued him and on finding him said, "Everyone is looking for you." He told them, "Let us go on to the nearby villages that I may preach there also. For this purpose have I come." So he went into their synagogues, preaching and driving out demons throughout the whole of Galilee.

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

Reading I: Job 7: 1-4, 6-7

Job temporarily pauses his dialogue with his three friends and turns to a lament about human life in general. He mentions three proverbially unhappy states in life and shows it is only with dependence on God that man has lasting happiness.

Reading II: I Corinthians 9: 16-19, 22-23

Preaching is Paul's acknowledged calling as a Christian, so he does not deserve credit for using the gift. His integrity is based on his love for all persons, no matter their situation.

The Gospel: Mark 1: 29-39

Jesus cures Peter's mother-in-law so completely that she gets up from bed to serve all in the house. Later, Jesus cures all the people who crowd Peter's door. We learn that the demons knew who Jesus was, but they were silenced by Him. The disciples will gradually come to know Jesus' identity.

THE HOLY SEE ISSUES

MODIFIED METHOD OF DISTRIBUTION OF ASHES

In order to be as safe as possible, the Committee of Divine Worship has issued the following protocol for the distribution ashes on Ash Wednesday.

"The Priest says the prayer for the blessing of ashes. He sprinkles the ashes with holy water without saying anything. Then he addresses all those present and only **once** says the formula as it appears in the Roman Missal, applying it to all in general: *"Repent, and believe in the Gospel"*, or

"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

The Priest then cleanses his hands, puts on a face mask and distributes the ashes to those who come to him or, if appropriate, he goes to those who are standing in their places. The Priest takes the ashes and sprinkles them on the head of each one without saying anything.

CHURCH GRANTS PLENARY INDULGENCE FOR YEAR OF ST. JOSEPH

The Apostolic Penitentiary issues a Decree granting plenary indulgences for the year of St. Joseph proclaimed by Pope Francis on Tuesday. The special year will last from 8 December 2020 to 8 December 2021.

Pope Francis on Tuesday announced a special year dedicated to St. Joseph starting from 8 December 2020 until 8 December 2021, on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of the proclamation of St. Joseph as the Patron of the Universal Church, as well as the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of Our Lady.

The Apostolic Penitentiary also issued a decree granting special indulgences for the duration of the special year to celebrate the anniversary and “to perpetuate the entrustment of the whole Church to the powerful patronage of the Custodian of Jesus.”

During this period, the faithful will have the opportunity to commit themselves “with prayer and good works, to obtain, with the help of St. Joseph, head of the heavenly Family of Nazareth, comfort and relief from the serious human and social tribulations that besiege the contemporary world today.”

Devotion to St. Joseph

The decree signed by Cardinal Mauro Piacenza, the Major Penitentiary of the Apostolic Penitentiary, and the Regent, Fr. Krzysztof Nykiel, notes that devotion to St. Joseph has grown extensively throughout the history of the Church, “which not only attributes to him high reverence after that of the Mother of God his spouse but has also given him multiple patronages.”

At the same time, the Magisterium of the Church continues to discover “old and new greatness in this treasure which is St. Joseph, like the master in the Gospel of Matthew who brings from his storeroom both the new and the old.” Therefore, the gift of indulgences granted through a decree of the Apostolic Penitentiary by mandate of the Holy Father “will be of great benefit to the perfect attainment of the appointed purpose.”

Conditions for the plenary indulgence

The plenary indulgence is granted to the faithful under the usual conditions (sacramental confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the Pope’s intentions) to Christians who, with a spirit detached from any sin, participate in the Year of St. Joseph on these occasions and manners indicated by the Apostolic Penitentiary:

- The plenary indulgence is granted to those who will meditate for at least 30 minutes on the Lord’s Prayer, or take part in a Spiritual Retreat of at least one day that includes a meditation on St. Joseph. “St. Joseph, an authentic man of faith, invites us”, the decree reads, “to rediscover our filial relationship with the Father, to renew fidelity to prayer, to listen and correspond with profound discernment to God’s will.”
- The indulgence can also be obtained by those who, following St. Joseph’s example, will perform a spiritual or corporal work of mercy. St. Joseph “encourages us to rediscover the value of silence, prudence and loyalty in carrying out our duties,” the decree notes.
- The recitation of the Holy Rosary in families and among engaged couples is another way of obtaining indulgences, in order that “all Christian families may be stimulated to recreate the same atmosphere of intimate communion, love and prayer that was in the Holy Family.”
- Everyone who entrusts their daily activity to the protection of St. Joseph, and every faithful who invokes the intercession of St. Joseph so that those seeking work can find dignifying work can also obtain the plenary indulgence. On 1 May 1955, Pope Pius XII instituted the feast of St. Joseph “with the intent that the dignity of work be recognized by all, and that it inspires social life and laws, based on the fair distribution of rights and duties.”
- The plenary indulgence is also granted to the faithful who will recite the Litany to St. Joseph (for the Latin tradition), or the *Akathistos* to St. Joseph (for the Byzantine tradition), or any other prayer to St. Joseph proper to the other liturgical traditions, for the persecuted Church *ad intra* and *ad extra*, and for the relief of all Christians suffering all forms of persecution. Because, the decree notes, “the flight of the Holy Family to Egypt shows us that God is there where man is in danger, where man suffers, where he runs away, where he experiences rejection and abandonment.”

A universal saint

In addition to these, the Apostolic Penitentiary grants a plenary indulgence to the faithful who will recite any legitimately approved prayer or act of piety in honor of St. Joseph, for example, “To you, O blessed Joseph” especially on “19 March, on 1 May, the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph, on St. Joseph’s Sunday (according to the Byzantine tradition) on the 19th of each month and every Wednesday, a day dedicated to the memory of the saint according to the Latin tradition.” The decree recalls the universality of St. Joseph’s patronage of the Church, noting that St. Teresa of Ávila recognized him as “a protector for all the circumstances of life”. Pope St. John Paul II also said that St. Joseph has “a renewed relevance for the Church of our time, in relation to the new Christian millennium.”

For the sick

Amid the ongoing Covid-19 health crisis, the gift of the plenary indulgence is also extended to the sick, the elderly, the dying and all those who for legitimate reasons are unable to leave their homes. They too can obtain the plenary indulgences if they are detached from any sin and have the intention of fulfilling, as soon as possible, the three usual conditions and recite an act of piety in honor of St. Joseph, offering to God the pains and hardships of their lives.

The role of priests

The Apostolic Penitentiary encourages priests to pastorally facilitate the celebration of the Sacrament of Penance and the administration of Holy Communion to the sick with a willing and generous spirit.

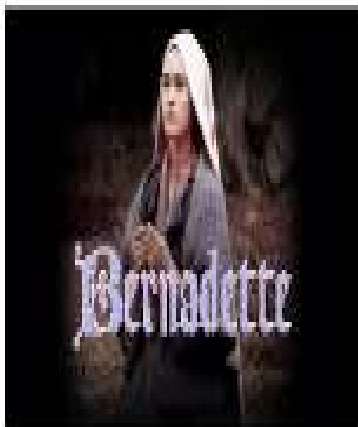
