



As I mentioned in my talk, hopefully you have received a letter from Bishop Sullivan asking you to prayerfully consider a sacrificial gift to the House of Charity for this year's campaign. If you have not received a letter, please take a pledge card from Church next Sunday, or call the parish office and request one. Along with the Bishop, I am also personally asking you to make a commitment in support of the vital programs that carry out the work of the Church throughout Southern New Jersey. As you know, these ministries benefit our less fortunate brothers and sisters in our local and surrounding communities. The gifts that come from our parish join those from throughout the diocese, enabling our workers to bring hope to those in need. Your generosity is especially crucial during the pandemic we are in.

Remember, the use of the funds collected through the House of Charity is restricted to the programs listed for the campaign and cannot be used for any other purpose. And it isn't the ushers' job to clean up everyone's mess at the end of Mass. So I am asking that we try to be like good backpackers at Mass and "leave no trace" except the wonderful prayers and worship that we gave to our Lord.

FEBRUARY 14 — SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Reading I: Leviticus 13: 1-2, 44-46

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron, "If someone has on his skin a scab or pustule or blotch which appears to be the sore of leprosy, he shall be brought to Aaron, the priest, or to one of the priests among his descendants. If the man is leprous and unclean, the priest shall declare him unclean by reason of the sore on his head. "The one who bears the sore of leprosy shall keep his garments rent and his head bare, and shall muffle his beard; he shall cry out, 'Unclean, unclean!' As long as the sore is on him he shall declare himself unclean, since he is in fact unclean. He shall dwell apart, making his abode outside the camp.".

Reading II: I Corinthians 10: 31-11:1

Brothers and sisters, Whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do everything for the glory of God. Avoid giving offense, whether to the Jews or Greeks or the church of God, just as I try to please everyone in every way, not seeking my own benefit but that of the many, that they may be saved. Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ.

The Gospel: Mark 1: 40-45

A leper came to Jesus and kneeling down begged him and said, "If you wish, you can make me clean." Moved with pity, he stretched out his hand, touched him, and said to him, "I do will it. Be made clean." The leprosy left him immediately, and he was made clean. Then, warning him sternly, he dismissed him at once. He said to him, "See that you tell no one anything, but go, show yourself to the priest and offer for your cleansing what Moses prescribed; that will be proof for them." The man went away and began to publicize the whole matter. He spread the report abroad so that it was impossible for Jesus to enter a town openly. He remained outside in deserted places, and people kept coming to him from everywhere.

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

Reading I: Leviticus 13: 1-2, 44-46

The disease specified as leprosy was in ancient days any rash or scab seen as a contagious skin Only the priest could determine whether or not its victim was worthy of temple worship. Once purified, the victim could reenter the community and worship with it.

Reading II: I Corinthians 10: 31-11:1

The community has the task of evangelization and must make conversion attractive, all the time avoiding obstacles to a prospect's decision. We are called to imitate Christ in our mission of outreach to others not Catholic.

The Gospel: Mark 1: 40-45

Jesus shows remarkable tenderness and compassion in curing the leper. He demands that the cured man obey the community law and go show himself to the priest.

THE HOLY SEE ISSUES MODIFIED METHOD OF DISTRIBUTION OF ASHES



In order to be as safe as possible, the Committee of Divine Worship has issued the following protocol for the distribution ashes on Ash Wednesday.

"The Priest says the prayer for the blessing of ashes. He sprinkles the ashes with holy water without saying anything. Then he addresses all those present and only **once** says the formula as it appears in the Roman Missal, applying it "Repent, and believe in the Gospel", or to all in general:

"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

The Priest then cleanses his hands, puts on a face mask and distributes the ashes to those who come to him or, if appropriate, he goes to those who are standing in their places. The Priest takes the ashes and sprinkles them on the head of each one without saying anything.

LENT 2021

This year the Church celebrates this coming Wednesday, February 17th, as Ash Wednesday. Even though we know it, it is important to remind ourselves each year that the season of Lent is much more than giving up stuff. It can and should be a time of great spiritual renewal for each of us and it offers us a great opportunity to be transformed and come closer to the Lord.

The ashes of Ash Wednesday (being given out a bit differently this year because of the pandemic) remind us of two things: firstly, our earthy mortality and secondly, that it is sin which causes our death. As there is no Easter glory without Lenten sacrifice, neither is there Lent without Easter. Throughout the penitential days of Lent, we look with hope to the Resurrection of Christ which conquers both sin and death. Therefore we reflect on our own sinfulness not in a despairing way but with the hope of overcoming our sinfulness through the power of Christ. Lent is a time we humbly and honestly recognize that we need to be saved; and it is Christ - by his passion, death, and resurrection- who saved us.

It is within this framework that we carry out our Lenten fast. All of our Lenten penance, self-denial fasting, almsgiving, and prayer are the means by which we turn away from sin and back towards the Lord and open ourselves up to his mercy. When we strip away from ourselves all those excess things that surround us we can more easily see that it is the Lord and the Lord alone who brings us completion and happiness.

We must also be concerned for others as well during our Lenten pilgrimage. Pope Francis reminds us in one of his Lenten messages, "Lent is a fitting time for self-denial; we would do well to ask ourselves what we can give up in order to help and enrich others by our own poverty. Let us not forget that real poverty hurts: no self-denial is real without this dimension of penance. I distrust a charity that costs nothing and does not hurt."

So when we choose not to have that piece of chocolate cake or box of Cheez-Its, or when we abstain from meat on Fridays, or when we make the effort to pray more, come to Mass during the week or to come to Adoration or Stations of the Cross, do it with an intention. Say to the Lord, "I make this offering to you Lord, in love, to enable me to open my heart to the vast power of your love and mercy, transform me into your likeness. Help me to see that union with you is my goal and you alone can help me reach it. Help me to see the needs of others and be willing to give of myself for them."

LENTEN REGULATIONS

Abstinence

All persons age 14 and older, are bound to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays of Lent and Good Friday.

Fasting

All persons age 18 and older, up to and including their 59th birthday, are bound to fast by limiting themselves to a single full meal on **Ash Wednesday and Good Friday**, while the other two meals are to be light.

How do we fast?


When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal.

Am I excused from fasting and abstinence?

Those who are excused from fast and abstinence outside the age limits include the **physically** or **mentally ill** including individuals suffering from **chronic illnesses** such as **diabetes**. Also excluded are **pregnant** or **nursing women**.
