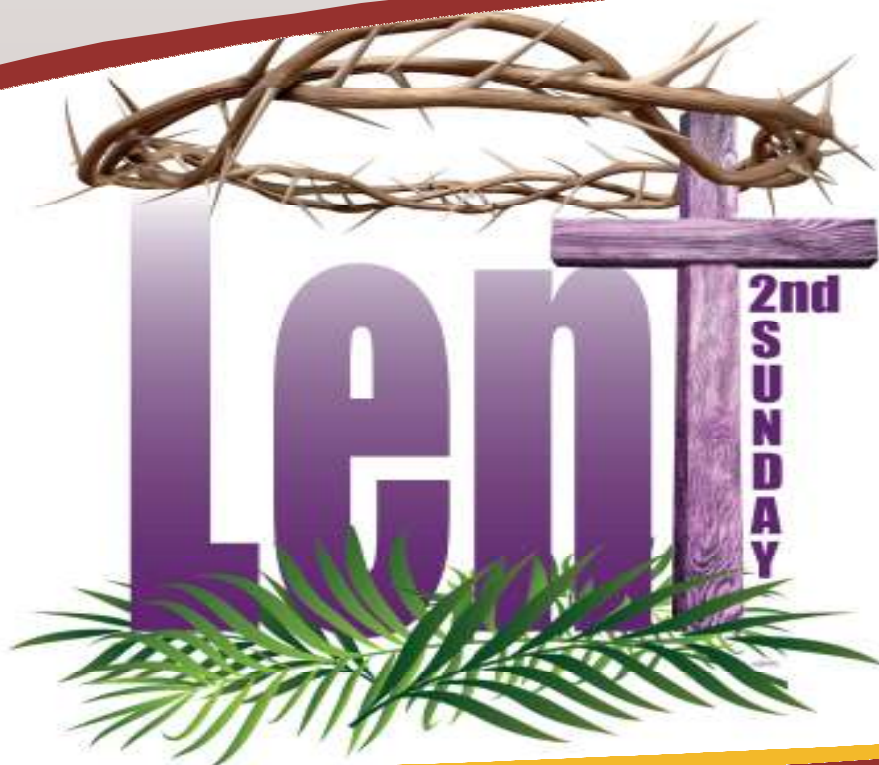

STEWARDSHIP CALLING

"Here I am!" he answered. - Genesis 22:11

It is easy to say, *"Here I am, Lord,"* when we are kneeling in church. But how easy is it to say *"Here I am, Lord,"* when a neighbor needs our help, when we are invited to join a parish ministry, or when we are asked to provide financial support? Often times we are called when it's not convenient for us.

Stewardship is not always easy. There will be times when it will make us uncomfortable and vulnerable.

Emotional Strength

We know that it is God's will that we take care of the spiritual part of ourselves. We need to practice our faith, pray regularly, receive the sacraments, and follow the Commandments. We know also that it is God's will that we must take good care of the physical part of ourselves as well. We need to eat and drink rightly and temperately, get enough exercise and sleep. Taking care of both "sides" of us is very important for our ability to reach our full God-given human potential.

There is another "side" of us that we don't talk about too much and is very important. Well we might talk about it, but we don't talk about how we can develop and strengthen it. This "side" is our psychological or emotional side. How we deal with and process our emotions is critical in living a good, happy, holy and moral life and how we can interact positively with others. Just like not taking care of our bodies will lead to physical sickness and not taking care of our souls will lead to spiritual sickness, so too not taking care of our emotional side will lead to psychological sickness.

All three parts of the human person are wounded by Original Sin and need God's grace to prosper. Nonetheless, our cooperation with and use of God's grace in our lives is essential to our overall wellbeing. If we don't exercise our bodies we get physically weak. At the same time if we overdo or improperly exercise, we can damage our bodies. If we don't pray, our souls get weak. However, if our prayer is only focused on ourselves and what we want, it can lead us to selfishness and be harmful to our spiritual wellbeing. Likewise if we don't exercise our passions and emotions (by trying to suppress them) we will become emotionally weak. But if we allow them to be unbridled and unrestrained, we are equally in trouble.

It's interesting to note that self-denial, properly exercised, affects all levels of a person: physical, spiritual, and emotional. During Lent when we freely abstain from something our bodies learn that we really don't "need" that doughnut, our will is strengthened when we resist the desire to eat the doughnut. Perhaps most important of all, our passions (emotions) learn that not having every want or desire fully satisfied is not going to harm us.

I sometimes wonder about the level of violence in the world today may be in part due to emotional weakness. Not necessarily mental illness, but mental weakness. While we might laugh at the "everyone gets a trophy" mentality that seems to be present in our country, I wonder if we should rather be concerned. Last place is not first place and it doesn't feel good to come in last. Nor should it. In our contemporary, very affluent society, we seem to want to insulate ourselves and especially our children from all negative emotions. While on one level this is understandable, it's nonetheless incomplete. Never learning how to process our emotions, especially the negative ones, is very dangerous. We can come to feel entitled to always get what we want, and then seek to get what we want no matter what the means. Also, we can easily seek to punish those who make us feel bad simply because we feel we should never feel bad.

St. Thomas Aquinas in the Middle Ages was one of the first Church theologians who effectively drew from ancient pagan philosophers. Notably he used some of the philosophical constructs of Aristotle to help explain Divine Revelation. St. Thomas remarked that true wisdom is accepting the truth no matter what the source, even from an enemy, simply because it's the truth. Perhaps, then, we can learn something from another ancient pagan, Seneca, the Roman philosopher, statesman, and playwright. He understood well the need for emotional strength and that it was acquired often through learning to endure negative emotional experiences. He said, *"Prosperity unbruised cannot endure a single blow, but a man who has been at a constant feud with misfortunes acquires skin calloused by suffering; he yields to no evil and even if he stumbles carries the fight on upon his knee."*

The season of Lent and the self-denial that goes with it, is not just about giving up stuff, it's about becoming stronger as a person, including the realization that a few callouses on our emotions and desires isn't a bad thing at all for they will enable us to survive the larger hurts that will inevitably come our way. If there was anyone who was a model of endurance of negative emotions it was Jesus. He didn't just carry the cross, he also carried the hatred, vilification, and contempt of his persecutors. And upon the cross he wasn't just forgiving the nails in his hands and feet, he was forgiving the emotional wounds in his soul that were caused by his enemies.

Maybe a fruitful reflection during the rest of our Lent can be this: to ask ourselves how well do we endure negative emotions? How often do we ask the Lord to help us be strong in the face of sadness and disappointment? Do we teach our children that negative emotions, like the sadness of losing a game or the betrayal of a friend, while not something "good" are still necessary to experience and it is a good thing to learn to process in their hearts without bitterness?

FEBRUARY 28 — SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT

Reading I: Genesis 22: 1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18 God put Abraham to the test. He called to him, "Abraham!" "Here I am!" he replied. Then God said: "Take your son Isaac, your only one, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah. There you shall offer him up as a holocaust on a height that I will point out to you."

When they came to the place of which God had told him, Abraham built an altar there and arranged the wood on it. Then he reached out and took the knife to slaughter his son. But the LORD's messenger called to him from heaven, "Abraham, Abraham!" "Here I am!" he answered. "Do not lay your hand on the boy," said the messenger. "Do not do the least thing to him. I know now how devoted you are to God, since you did not withhold from me your own beloved son." As Abraham looked about, he spied a ram caught by its horns in the thicket. So he went and took the ram and offered it up as a holocaust in place of his son. Again the LORD's messenger called to Abraham from heaven and said: "I swear by myself, declares the LORD, that because you acted as you did in not withholding from me your beloved son, I will bless you abundantly and make your descendants as countless as the stars of the sky and the sands of the seashore; your descendants shall take possession of the gates of their enemies, and in your descendants all the nations of the earth shall find blessing— all this because you obeyed my command."

Reading II: Romans 8: 31b-34 Brothers and sisters: If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but handed him over for us all, how will he not also give us everything else along with him? Who will bring a charge against God's chosen ones? It is God who acquits us, who will condemn? Christ Jesus it is who died—or, rather, was raised—who also is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us.

The Gospel: Mark 9: 2-10 The Spirit drove Jesus out into the desert, and he remained in the desert for forty days, tempted by Satan. He was among wild beasts, and the angels ministered to him. After John had been arrested, Jesus came to Galilee proclaiming the gospel of God: "This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel."

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

Reading I: Genesis 22: 1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18 Yahweh gives Abraham the ultimate test, that of sacrificing his favorite son Isaac. Observing Abraham's unquestioning obedience, Yahweh calls off the killing, accepting the sacrifice of a nearby ram. He also promises Abraham abundant rewards, including the growth of a great people as his descendants.

Reading II: Romans 8: 31b-34 St. Paul provides his readers a solid basis for their hope, specifying along the way the unique power of Jesus' intercession for us with His Father. He also asks "If God is for us, who can be against us?"

The Gospel: Mark 9: 2-10 The transfiguration of Jesus was such a dazzling experience for Peter that he nervously proposes setting up three tents so that the three persons from the world beyond could stay and prolong it. But immediately after, Jesus brings the three apostles down to earth to complete their earthly mission..

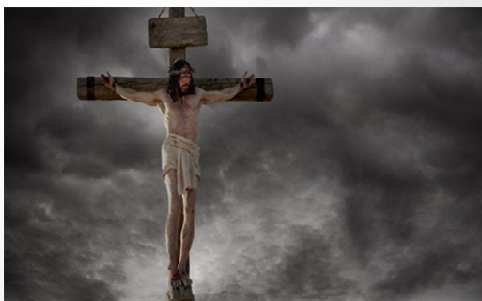

LENTEN REGULATIONS



Abstinence

All persons age 14 and older, are bound to abstain from eating meat on **Ash Wednesday, all Fridays of Lent and Good Friday.**

Fasting

All persons age 18 and older, up to and including their 59th birthday, are bound to fast by limiting themselves to a single full meal on **Ash Wednesday and Good Friday**, while the other two meals are to be light.

How do we fast?

When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal.

Am I excused from fasting and abstinence?

Those who are excused from fast and abstinence outside the age limits include the **physically or mentally ill** including individuals suffering from **chronic illnesses** such as **diabetes**. Also excluded are **pregnant or nursing women**.

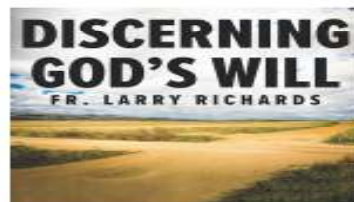

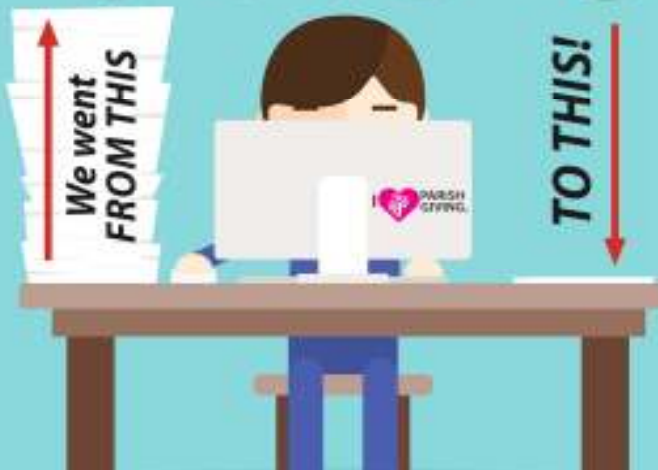
