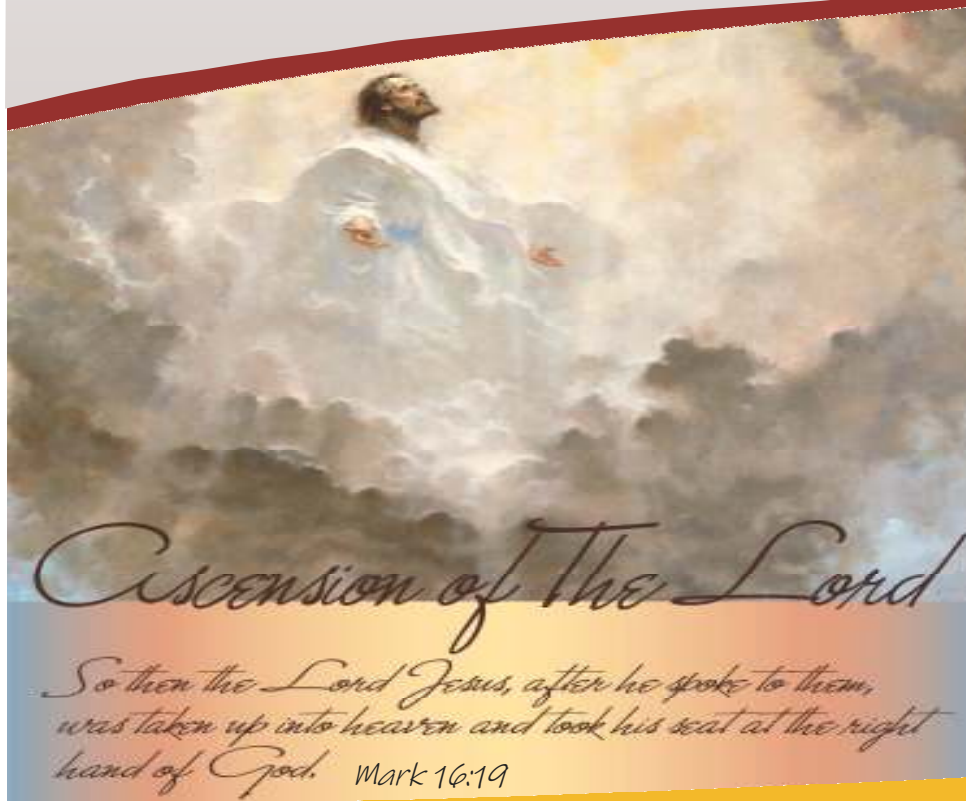

Virtue and Vice

The simple definition of “virtue” is “a habitual and firm disposition to do the good.” A virtuous person tends toward the good with all his or her sensory and spiritual powers. The virtuous person pursues the good and chooses it in concrete actions. Human virtues themselves “are firm attitudes, stable dispositions, habitual perfections of intellect and will that govern our actions, order our passions, and guide our conduct according to reason and faith.” (CCC n.1804) For example, a person who displays the virtue of patience not only chooses to be patient, but also wants to be patient and enjoys being patient. A truly patient person is not the same as one who struggles to be patient.

Think of the following illustration. There is an obvious difference between someone who correctly assembles a child’s new toy bike only after much hesitation, difficulty and a great deal of time and someone who assembles the bike with ease, hardly looking at the directions. While both have the ability to correctly finish the task, the second person can be said to be “mechanically inclined” and possesses an affinity or a disposition for that type of activity that makes it both easy and pleasurable for the person to successfully complete such tasks. Likewise there is a difference between someone who makes the right choice of behavior only with great hesitation and difficulty on one hand and the virtuous person who chooses well with ease because he or she is disposed to.

A human being is composed of body and soul, and has various capacities and powers: He or she has intellectual powers (the capacity to know and understand), appetitive powers (the capacity to desire or feel), and decisive powers (the capacity to choose or will). Although choosing something is itself an act of the will, we make our choices based on what we have judged to be good (or bad) in some way as well as how we feel about it or what our desire is. Because of the complexity of the human being we can be disposed to do well or badly according to how the different powers we possess affect us at the time. For example, our emotions and/or desires may have a disposition to go one way independently of our judgment of what is truly good often giving rise to inner conflict, or worse, immoral behavior. Habitual dispositions to choose and do what is good are called virtues while habitual dispositions to choose and do what is wrong are called vices. Hence a virtuous person is disposed to do the good while a vicious person is disposed to do wrong.

There probably aren’t too many of us who are truly, fully virtuous in the full meaning of the term. While we may possess certain virtues (that is in some areas we are habitually disposed to do the right thing and want to do it), we can also struggle to want and/or do the good in other areas, and finally in other areas, we may possess certain vices as well.

So what do we do to become virtuous? We read in the Catechism, “The moral virtues are acquired by human effort. They are the fruit and seed of morally good acts; they dispose all the powers of the human being for communion with divine love.” (CCC n.1804) In other words, we develop virtues by practicing the virtue. For instance, we become patient by being patient. As we struggle against the desire or inclination to be impatient, with each successful attempt at being patient we will begin to take control of ourselves and to develop the virtue of patience. It works the same way for the other human virtues. Our job is to identify those areas that we need to work on and consciously attempt to change our behavior to what is good, eventually our emotions will follow.

Be sure to check out future columns on the Cardinal Virtues: prudence, fortitude, temperance, and justice, the “pivotal” virtues that all the others are grouped around and how they bring us closer to God.

The Bankruptcy Court has established **June 30, 2021 at 11:59 p.m.** (prevailing Eastern time) as the deadline to file proofs of claim against the Diocese (the “**Bar Date**”).

If you have a claim against the Diocese including, without limitation, a claim related to sexual abuse committed by any person connected with the Diocese, you must file a claim on or before the Bar Date with Prime Clerk, the appointed Claims Agent.

IF YOU DO NOT TIMELY FILE A PROOF OF CLAIM, YOU MAY FORFEIT YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE ON ANY PLAN OF REORGANIZATION AND TO SHARE IN ANY DISTRIBUTIONS TO CREDITORS IN CONNECTION WITH THE DIOCESE’S CHAPTER 11 CASE.

MAY 16 — ASCENSION OF THE LORD

Reading I: Acts of the Apostles 1: 1-11

In the first book, Theophilus, I dealt with all that Jesus did and taught until the day he was taken up, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. He presented himself alive to them by many proofs after he had suffered, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. While meeting with them, he enjoined them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for “the promise of the Father about which you have heard me speak; for John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.” When they had gathered together they asked him, “Lord, are you at this time going to restore the kingdom to Israel?” He answered them, “It is not for you to know the times or seasons that the Father has established by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.” When he had said this, as they were looking on, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him from their sight. While they were looking intently at the sky as he was going, suddenly two men dressed in white garments stood beside them. They said, “Men of Galilee, why are you standing there looking at the sky? This Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven will return in the same way as you have seen him going into heaven.”

Reading II: Ephesians 1:17- 23

Brothers and sisters: May the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, give you a Spirit of wisdom and revelation resulting in knowledge of him. May the eyes of your hearts be enlightened, that you may know what is the hope that belongs to his call, what are the riches of glory in his inheritance among the holy ones, and what is the surpassing greatness of his power for us who believe, in accord with the exercise of his great might, which he worked in Christ, raising him from the dead and seating him at his right hand in the heavens, far above every principality, authority, power, and dominion, and every name that is named not only in this age but also in the one to come. And he put all things beneath his feet and gave him as head over all things to the church, which is his body, the fullness of the one who fills all things in every way.

OR: Eph 4:1-13 or 4:1-7, 11-13

Brothers and sisters, I, a prisoner for the Lord, urge you to live in a manner worthy of the call you have received, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another through love, striving to preserve the unity of the spirit through the bond of peace: one body and one Spirit, as you were also called to the one hope of your call; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all. But grace was given to each of us according to the measure of Christ's gift. Therefore, it says: *He ascended on high and took prisoners captive; he gave gifts to men.* What does “he ascended” mean except that he also descended into the lower regions of the earth? The one who descended is also the one who ascended far above all the heavens, that he might fill all things. And he gave some as apostles, others as prophets, others as evangelists, others as pastors and teachers, to equip the holy ones for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until we all attain to the unity of faith and knowledge of the Son of God, to mature to manhood, to the extent of the full stature of Christ.

Gospel: Mark 16: 15-20

Jesus said to his disciples: “Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature. Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved; whoever does not believe will be condemned. These signs will accompany those who believe: in my name they will drive out demons, they will speak new languages. They will pick up serpents with their hands, and if they drink any deadly thing, it will not harm them. They will lay hands on the sick, and they will recover.” So then the Lord Jesus, after he spoke to them, was taken up into heaven and took his seat at the right hand of God. But they went forth and preached everywhere, while the Lord worked with them and confirmed the word through accompanying signs.

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

Reading I: Acts of the Apostles 1: 1-11

The presence of the two angels places the ascension of Jesus in a special category. The connection made with this event and the Second Coming of Christ puts the event beyond ordinary history. It ends Christ's time of physical presence and also the end of the Church's time.

Reading II: Ephesians 4: 1-13, or 4: 1-7, 11-13

St. Paul asserts that we have all been gifted by the Holy Spirit and that there is both unity and diversity in the Church. This should promote a certain manner of life for us.

The Gospel: Mark 16: 15-20

Jesus instructs His disciples to baptize all nations in His name. He also assures them that they will be seeing all kinds of wonderful signs of His abiding presence even after He “was taken up into heaven.”

Monday: Acts 19:1-8; Ps 68:2-3ab, 4-5acd, 6-7ab; Jn 16:29-33
Tuesday: Acts 20:17-27; Ps 68:10-11, 20-21; Jn 17:1-11a
