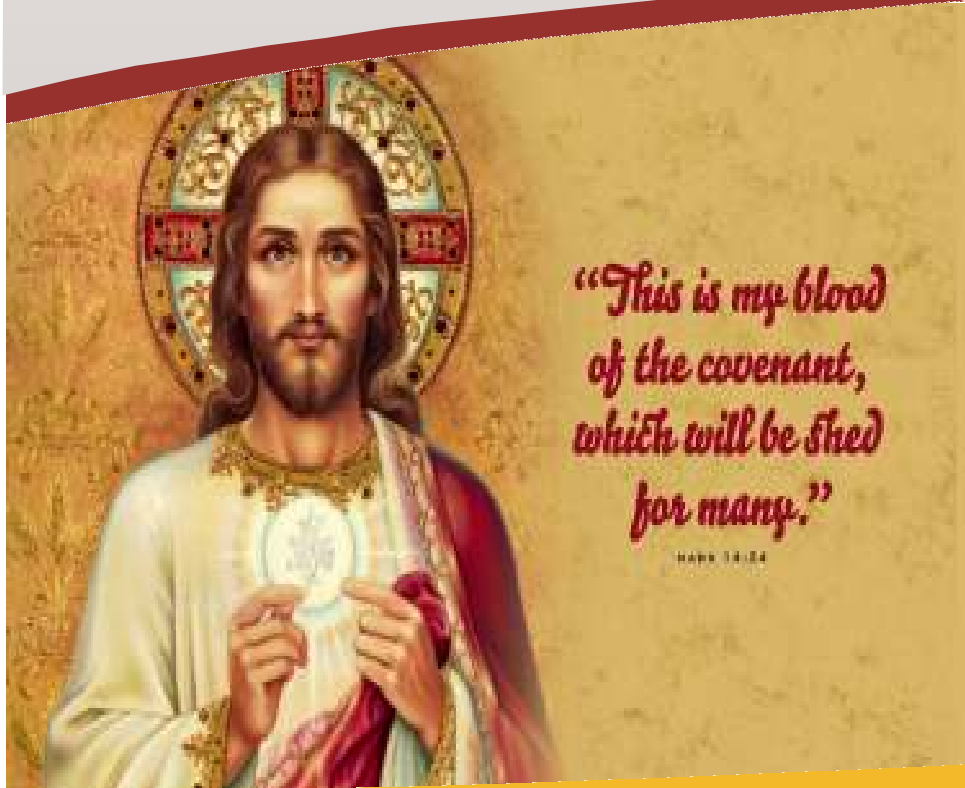

The Cardinal Virtues: Justice

Justice is both a complex and, in today's world, a very weighty issue. From the ancient Greek philosophers until modern time, people have written volumes on the ideas of justice and rights. I could not hope to be comprehensive in a short column, but I will try to outline its basic principles, hopefully giving a helpful approach we can use to address this important issue. It should be noted that the Church believes that the virtue of justice is the foundation of all discussion on justice.

As always, we shall begin with the definition of justice and proceed from there. Most definitions of justice are deceptively simple for such a complex idea. The Catechism gives a version of the classic definition of Justice, "Justice is the moral virtue that consists in the constant and firm will to give their due to God and neighbor." (CCC 1087) Since virtue requires the "constant and firm" will to live out the virtue, one can only possess the particular virtue if one actually lives it out on a regular basis. However, it is possible that one can perform a virtuous act in a given situation without necessarily possessing the virtue. Ultimately, it is our job to develop the virtues through their practice in cooperation with God's grace so that they can become part of us, making it easier for us to follow the greatest commandment, "to love God above all things and our neighbor as ourselves."

But back to justice. What does it mean to give a person his or her "due", that is, what he or she deserves? It's not always easy to see, that's for sure. If you would allow me to bypass the theological and philosophical discussion and get right to the answer, what is "due" to a person is due to them by reason of creation, by being created in the image and likeness of God. Every human being shares equally in exalted nature given to us by God. Thus, justice comes from our basic human nature and dignity as God has created us. This is because every external act performed by a person has some sort of social consequence, we don't and can't act in a vacuum. We can see justice as to do one's duty towards another. Another way of putting it, being "just" is to recognize and treat someone according to his or her human dignity. While it's easy to follow the norms of justice when it is based on agreements, laws, promises, treaties, etc., other times it is difficult and this is where the aspect of human dignity comes in. For example, if you agree to buy a neighbor's car for an agreed upon a price, you give your neighbor the money, your neighbor gives you the car. Fair and square, justice done. On the other hand, we know an employer should pay employees a fair and living wage while at the same time the employees should work diligently for the time allotted. But what if they don't agree on what is fair? Employers may try to pay employees less than the employees think they deserve while the employees may work less diligently than the employers think they should, bringing on conflict.

While we can't individually solve all of the injustice we see around us, we can make sure we ourselves are being just towards others. This is where it always starts...with each of us individually. Usually it just takes a bit of thought and honesty about the situation. As far back as the Greek philosophers who wrote about justice, there has always been an understanding that the greater harm comes to the person who commits injustice rather than the victim of it. While the person who commits injustice may be causing harm to a person by violating someone's human dignity he or she is actually *destroying* his or her own human dignity in the process.

In the end, if we remember the second part of the Great Commandment "Love your neighbor as yourself" we should be pretty much on the path of justice by giving to others what is due to them and treating them according to their God given human dignity.

STATEMENT OF THE NEW JERSEY BISHOPS ***Reinstating the General Obligation to Attend Mass***

At this time, due to the observance of public safety protocols and the increase in the availability of vaccines, we have begun a return to some sense of normalcy in various sectors of our society.

Therefore, we the Catholic Bishops of New Jersey, are lifting the dispensation of the Sunday and Holy Days Mass obligation beginning on Saturday, June 5, 2021, and Sunday, June 6, 2021, Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. We welcome the Christian faithful to return to the regular participation in the Sunday Eucharist, the source and summit of our Catholic faith (cf. Code of Canon Law canon 1247 and Catechism of the Catholic Church, n. 2180).

This obligation does not apply to those who are ill; those who have reason to believe that they were recently exposed to the coronavirus or another serious or contagious illness; those who are confined to their home, a hospital, or nursing facility; or those with serious underlying health conditions. One should consult the local pastor if questions arise about the obligation to attend Mass (canon 87).

Finally, safety protocols (such as wearing masks, social distancing, etc.) and liturgical directives (communion in the hand, communion under one species, etc.) in each New Jersey Diocese remains in place until modified or revoked by the respective Diocesan Bishop.

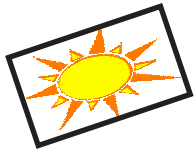

We need your help to spruce up the grounds at Holy Angels!

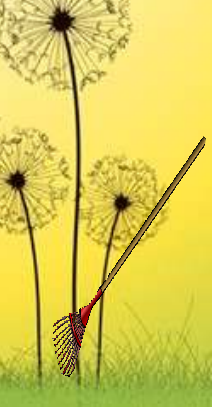

In March 2021, The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announced a new program to provide financial assistance to families for certain COVID-19-related funeral expenses incurred due to a COVID-19-related death.

FEMA began accepting applications for Funeral Assistance on April 12, 2021 through a dedicated call center. The phone number for the FEMA Funeral Assistance Program is 844-684-6333 | TTY: 800-462-7585. Hours of operation are Monday through Friday 9AM—9PM eastern time.

To apply, you must call FEMA, there is no online application. The person applying must be the individual who incurred the funeral expense for the deceased. Please understand that FEMA will NOT speak to any businesses like funeral homes or cemeteries.

NO ONLINE APPLICATIONS ACCEPTED

FEMA asks that you have all documentation in hand before calling. This will speed up the process.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT on October 1, 2020, The Diocese of Camden, New Jersey, (the “Diocese”) filed for protection under Chapter 11 of Title 11 of the United States Code.

The Bankruptcy Court has established **June 30, 2021 at 11:59 p.m. (prevailing Eastern time) as the deadline to file proofs of claim against the Diocese (the “Bar Date”).**

If you have a claim against the Diocese including, without limitation, a claim related to sexual abuse committed by any person connected with the Diocese, you must file a claim on or before the Bar Date with Prime Clerk, the appointed Claims Agent.

JUNE 6 — CORPUS CHRSTI SUNDAY

Reading I: Exodus 24: 3-8

When Moses came to the people and related all the words and ordinances of the LORD, they all answered with one voice, "We will do everything that the LORD has told us." Moses then wrote down all the words of the LORD and, rising early the next day, he erected at the foot of the mountain an altar and twelve pillars for the twelve tribes of Israel. Then, having sent certain young men of the Israelites to offer holocausts and sacrifice young bulls as peace offerings to the LORD, Moses took half of the blood and put it in large bowls; the other half he splashed on the altar. Taking the book of the covenant, he read it aloud to the people, who answered, "All that the LORD has said, we will heed and do." Then he took the blood and sprinkled it on the people saying, "This is the blood of the covenant that the LORD has made with you in accordance with all these words of his." "

Reading II: Hebrews 9: 11-15

Brothers and sisters: When Christ came as high priest of the good things that have come to be, passing through the greater and more perfect tabernacle not made by hands, that is, not belonging to this creation, he entered once for all into the sanctuary, not with the blood of goats and calves but with his own blood, thus obtaining eternal redemption. For if the blood of goats and bulls and the sprinkling of a heifer's ashes can sanctify those who are defiled so that their flesh is cleansed, how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself unblemished to God, cleanse our consciences from dead works to worship the living God. For this reason he is mediator of a new covenant: since a death has taken place for deliverance from transgressions under the first covenant, those who are called may receive the promised eternal inheritance

Gospel: Mark 14: 12-16, 22-26

On the first day of the Feast of Unleavened Bread, when they sacrificed the Passover lamb, Jesus' disciples said to him, "Where do you want us to go and prepare for you to eat the Passover?" He sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the city and a man will meet you, carrying a jar of water. Follow him. Wherever he enters, say to the master of the house, 'The Teacher says, "Where is my guest room where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?"'" Then he will show you a large upper room furnished and ready. Make the preparations for us there." The disciples then went off, entered the city, and found it just as he had told them; and they prepared the Passover. While they were eating, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, gave it to them, and said, "Take it; this is my body." Then he took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, and they all drank from it. He said to them, "This is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many. Amen, I say to you, I shall not drink again the fruit of the vine until the day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God." Then, after singing a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives.

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

Reading I: Exodus 24: 3-8

Moses, as leader, ratifies the Covenant between God and the people. The blood of the animal is splashed on both the altar and the people as the sign of this union.

Reading II: Hebrews 9: 11-15

Just as the Hebrew high priest had the right of access to the Holy of Holies because he bore the blood of the sacrificial animals with him, so Jesus the High Priest of the New Covenant, by the shedding of His Blood has access to the heavenly sanctuary.

The Gospel: Mark 14: 12-16, 22-26

Jesus had pre-arranged the room in the upper story of a house in Jerusalem. Mark connects the bread and wine at the meal with Jesus' imminent death.
